Energize your hobby teach a kid to fish!

What a surprize it has been to me to find out how much fun it is to teach a kid how to fish! I never had given it much thought until my 14 year old grandson moved to town, and we could spend some time together.

The last time we had fished together was about four years ago. He loved it! But unfortunately, it was the day that my boat popped a freeze plug and we had to abort the trip early because the boat was sinking.

So now we could get together afternoons after school. Our first trips were over to Bullock's Cove. I rigged up three light rods (all won in our East Bay monthly raffles) with "Snapper Poppers." The first lesson was casting those poppers.

And we caught snapper blues. These were put into plastic bags for later use off the bridge.


After catching snappers at the boat ramp and at the inlet by Lavin's, our next trips were to the Warren River Bridge.

For this, we upped the ante by buying a couple eels, and a few worms. We spent one evening at the bridge, learning to cast spin rigs and conventional rigs. We floated worms way up into the pond on the tide, and did the same with the eels. The worms caught schoolie bass, and the eels had a bath.

The next adventure was a half-day with charter captain Charlie Brown. That's the high point so far. Charlie is a great teacher. He explained everything he was doing. We caught a lot of bass and blues, and Jonathan wants more. And so does Will.
